This month we will be working on Villa Rosa's SKY DIAMOND. The pattern, which utilizes HST with one sew and flip corner, is available at Swifty Stitches as well as on the Villa Rosa Designs website. Again this month, Sandee Rudolph is busy measuring, cutting and sewing to provide a mini version of the pattern for those who like to drive themselves nuts with tiny pieces. If the mini version is your cup of tea, contact Sandee for information. When selecting your fabrics, I'd advise you to be sure there's good contrast between your background fabrics and the diamond fabric. Without contrast, the diamond effect fades into the background and is lost. So dig through your stash and join Sandee, Sheila and Linda on April 24, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. for more fun, laughs and good times while sewing. We still have lots of participation prizes (way better than a little participation trophy), so check in and check us out. Sew our project, work on your own UFO or PhD, or Zoom in just to socialize.

Getting to Know You - Donna Palmer

Donna, was born on August 1, 1950 and was raised in San Diego, CA. Donna is the oldest of 7 children. Her dad was in the navy until he retired and then he worked as a machinist. Donna's mother, a homemaker, was an extraordinary seamstress - see it in a store and she could copy anything. In Donna's early years she was jealous of others because she didn't have store bought clothing to wear. But there was a bright side of that. Donna and her sisters had dolls with clothes galore, and her dad kept the boys happy because he would get used tricycles, bicycles, peddle cars, etc. and would repaint them with flames & strips. Donna & her siblings were the envy of the neighborhood because of what their parents could do.

Donna tells an amazing story about her adored 5th grade teacher, who also worked as a tour guide at the San Diego Zoo. He had awesome animal stories and she thought the sun rose and set on him. As she became a teenager she really appreciated her homemade clothing - that fit her thin body! She took Home Economics and Art in school and had a dream of becoming a Home Ec teacher. That didn't pan out but, in those two classes, she learned skills that paid off in spades all through her life.

In the middle of her senior year, she met Everett, the love of her life - a sailor stationed at the San Diego Naval Air Station. In 1968, he received orders to Vietnam. They decided it was time to get married and they did.

After Vietnam, the navy moved them several times and, in the process, they became parents of 3 children, in 1969,1971,& 1972. Their first stop was Long Beach, then Lemore NAS, and THEN to Adak -ALASKA! Adak is one of the islands in the Aleutian chain and from 1942 to 1997, the whole island was a naval base/airfield. It is so far out that they could see Russia & Russian ships - if the clouds lifted. Checking the Internet, Adak is described as a cold, foggy, windy and muddy place to be but, Donna's children loved it there. It was a place where they made the most of the freedom they had to run the island - to play and to fish with all the other military kids. Even more noteworthy, that is where Donna learned to guilt. She thought they were going to need guilts so they wouldn't freeze to death during this assignment. It turned out that they couldn't even sleep under the quilts she made because they were TOO thick - they made everyone too hot. She had used 3 layers of Fat Bat and tied the guilts. She gave them away to friends being transferred to Greenland where it is really cold.





Donna had a couple of jobs over the military years. First, was working for an attorney preparing and serving subpoenas. She followed that by working in an engineering office.

In 1989 her husband, having gained the rank of senior chief, retired from the navy and, because her husband was originally from Chico, that is where they decided to move, but only for a couple of years. During that time she managed a Ben Franklin store. Not wanting to stay too long in one place, they moved to Washington for a year. That is when a friend called and offered Donna a position with My Creations. Donna accepted the offer and they moved again, to Citrus Heights where she managed the My Creations that use to be on Madison & Kenneth. From that job, Donna retired. After her husband's naval retirement, he worked for several Home Depots - he could get jobs everywhere. He permanently retired a few years after Donna. The move to Citrus Heights was suppose to be temporarily but, they find them selves still here after 25 years - definitely the longest they have ever lived anywhere. Their children grew up, married, and now there are 6 grandchildren - ages now of 14 - 17.

During these last 25 years Donna's resumé grew longer. She started off teaching tole painting. Then that grew into a little business of painting things in people's homes. A couple of examples are the customer who wanted trim in her dining room that matched her china. Another customer wanted a mural on a wall. She also painted clothing, sold patterns, and she did Folsom & Cal Expo craft shows for years, which provided a sizable income for her.

During this pandemic there are several things that have been keeping Donna, and her husband, busy. Starting off, she coordinated with Sharon Baxter to make our 2022 opportunity quilt, she repaired 2 quilts for a man who's wife had passed away but she hasn't sewn a stitch since. She also cares for six (neutered) feral cats and two rescued shih tzus. Then there has been the huge project of completely refurbishing the inside of their home - painting, laying new floors, and finishing with new baseboards through out the house. She had to pack many things away so this could be accomplished and she is eagerly waiting for the project to get completely finished so she can unpack everything and get sewing again.

One has to wonder how, with such a busy life, did, she find the time to be the 1st president (#1) of the Golden Valley Quilt Guild in 2002? She was president a 2nd time in 2004, and when she becomes our 2022 president, it will be her 3rd time!

Share & Care - March Madness

As most of you know, I am a graduate of Gonzaga University, a small Jesuit school in Spokane, Washington, that is highly rated for academics, and just happens to be a little bit crazy about college hoops.
