I am happy to announce that we are partnering with the local "Freedom Quilters of California" organization to make and distribute 1,000+ pillowcases to El Dorado County veterans on or before Veterans Day, November 11. Any military veteran in our county will be given a patriotic-themed pillowcase. Both High Sierra Quilters and Brother's Sewing and Vacuums in Cameron Park will provide kits and instructions for making the pillowcases. Kits can be purchased for \$10, pillowcase sewed and then donated.

Of course, if you have your own red, white and blue fabrics, you are welcome to pick up the pattern at either store and use your own fabrics. Drop off for completed pillowcases will be at both stores.

Introducing Mary Ward . . . Your NEW Community Service Chair!

I am excited to be the new coordinator for community service. Since moving to this area two years ago, I have been looking for a volunteer position where I would be able help, aid and assist in different ways. This role is perfect for me.

In the past two weeks in my new role, I have met with Sheila and others to learn the process of accepting, sorting, labeling, distributing, and tracking donations.

I have talked with our contact, Victoria, at Volunteers of America and was thrilled to hand over 28 beautiful quilts from our guild.

I have contacted Jackie Guzman, founder of The Glass Slipper (thanks Donna Palmer for the lead!) and will be meeting up with her to give her eight quilts suitable for teenage girls. She was very appreciative for my call and thrilled to accept these quilts knowing that the girls in her program would enjoy them.

In the near future, I will be touring both the Volunteers of America location and The Glass Slipper to get a deeper insight to what services they provide to our community.

Getting to Know You - Jane Samuelson

On September 23, 1927 Chico, CA welcomed a new citizen. Her name was Arvilla Jane Wiggins. At the time of Jane's birth her parents were living with Jane's great grand mother because her father, a newspaper reporter, was unemployed at the time, but trying to grow & sell tomatoes, corn & beans to make a little money. When Jane was about 6-weeks old they were able to move back to the bay area, settling in Oakland. For several years her father worked for the San Francisco Chronicle, Oakland Tribune, Berkeley Gazette, and Fresno Bee - he made it clear he would NEVER have worked for William Randolph Hearst (that was a big no-no.)

Seventeen month's after Jane was born she got a little sister. Though her mother had a teaching credential she was a committed stay-athome mom - teasing her husband that, if she ever did go to work he would know she was leaving him. During WW2, however, her mom, to help the cause, did teach for a while and this was a nervous time for her dad.

When Jane was 4, her dad found himself out of newspaper work again so they moved just south of Dixon to a ranch managed by Jane's grandfather. Just before turning 5, Jane started school in a 10 student, one room country school (painting done by Jane in 1950) that had no electricity, no plumbing, and they had to pump



any needed water from a well. She stayed at that school for 6 years same school, same kids, same teacher. In those 6 years Jane completed 7 grades of work but that kinda was a problem - where should she go next? .Jane was sent to live in San Francisco with her grandmother who taught sewing at a junior high school. Jane repeated 7th grade but that was okay with her because there were so many new things - like music, art, & P.E. This was when Jane's grandmother put the finishing touches on Jane's sewing skills.

Jane says, after half the year her grandmother had had enough of her so she returned home and the rest of her education was at the town school in Dixon. Every day her mother had to drive 9 miles each way to take her, and her sister, to and from school. Other than 'being a nerd" she claims no fame during those years. After graduation she attended U.C. Berkeley and graduated with a BS degree in Home Economics. At Cal she was in Treble Clef (a girls singing group) and, because of that, she met her 1st boyfriend, Richard Malcom Teeter, a chemistry major who was in the boy's Glee Club. Their first date was a very fancy dinner with dancing at the Claremont Hotel. After her graduation Jane studied another year at Cal to get a teaching credential and then after "Dick" graduated, they got married and moved to Seattle for 4 years while he got his PhD at the University of Washington. They survived nicely on his GI Bill and her always being able to find employment at the university. They then moved back to Albany where he got the dream job he had always wanted - working for the Chevron Refinery in Richmond doing research. They had 3 sons, James ('54), Steven ('56),& Donald ('58), and during this time, they built a house and moved to Orinda. Sadly, in 1959, at the age of 4, their first son, James, died of Leukemia.

Their marriage lasted only 12 years. Jane was able to stay in the house & she found work as a secretary. Lacking any social life she moved back to Berkeley where she worked for a law company. Hoping to have the summers off to be with her boys, she decided to try to teach but it was substitution and she didn't like it. She became aware of a job opening teaching home economics (mostly cooking) at the State School for the Adult Blind which is part of The Department of Rehabilitation. She interviewed, got the job (a job that no one else wanted) but then wondered, with no experience, how was she going to do it? After 23 years there, she retired.

> Early on, in this new job, she met Frank Samuelson, who was in the business of selling, and repairing used washer and dryers. In 1977 they got married, each bringing their children into the family. They had an unbelievable honeymoon to England and this sparked Jane's interest in traveling. They also discovered that they liked to do Scottish country dancing together. Jane, in her 90s was still doing this when the COVID pandemic hit.

Quilting was in the family so, encouraged by a couple of friends, Jane became a member of the East Bay Area Quilters (#1). They have annual retreats in Point Benita - she probably attend those retreats for 30 years - her last

time attending was just before the pandemic - she accepts that she probably will not be doing that again.

Because of her ancestry, Jane & Frank traveled to Scotland. But, soon after that, Frank decided he didn't like traveling. Jane decided she would travel alone - several times returning to Scotland. On every day of every trip she would write a page in her diary for Frank. She would rip it out, mail it to him and he knew he was to save it for her return - each page was then returned to its place in her diary.

In 1994 Jane & Frank moved to Monte Rio, where she joined the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild (#2).

Unfortunately, after 21 years, this marriage also ended in divorce. Jane stayed in Monte Rio for about 3 years. Then, in 1999, she sold the house, moved to American Canyon & rented a home for 10 months. There, she join the Napa Quilt Guild (#3). In 2000, she moved to Benicia where she joined the Carquinez Strait Stitchers (#4) and, finally, in 2012, she moved to Sacramento to be close to her youngest son, Don, now a retired Intel electrical engineer. Jane's other son, Steve, was a music major and lives in New Orleans - drawn there by the jazz music.

When she moved to Sacramento, seeking a local quilt guild was a priority. She picked Golden Valley (#5). She's a keeper!
