I sort **patriotic quilts** evenly between Mercy and UC Davis and VOA. The larger the better for adults.

Zephyr Retreat—There are still openings!

Zephyr dates for 2022 are June 5-10.

Yes, prices have gone up. They have also changed pricing on their rooms. Instead of a split between roommates, the rooms will be a flat rate of \$130 a night. So, we have set up a tiered pricing system. There will be pricing for single, double, and triple occupancy (there will be very few single and triple rooms, so those will be on a first come, first served basis).

Payments will be divided into three: \$200 in November, \$200 in January, and the balance in March. Your final payment will depend on how many are in a room (one to three) and the payment for setup and takedown (\$275) will be divided by the number of people attending. Final payment will be approximately \$30 to \$260 (again, depending on how many are in a room. Nonmembers can increase the total by \$20.

Getting to Know You - Candice Buerer

Goggle says that in 1950 the population of Ukiah, CA was 6,135. It might have been a whopping 6,150 on April 20, 1952 when Candice Janine Banks was born. She didn't stay there very long because her parents, Homer & Phyllis, decided to move to Sierra Ski Ranch. When Candice was 3 years old they moved to North Highlands. Candice attended Larchmont Elementary School through 3rd grade but then the family finally settled down when they moved to a home on Green Creek Way in Citrus Heights. She then attended Leighton Little John Elementary School, Will Rogers Junior High School and, eventually, graduated from San Juan High School in 1970.

In high school, Candice was very active in the youth group connected to the Church of the Nazarene. One of the regular youth activities was roller skating at a rink in Rocklin and when she was 16 she met Steve Buerer (an "older man" at 19) at one of these skating activities. They dated for a short time but then they broke up. However, a year later they got back together and, after her graduation, they got married in February of 1971. Continuing to be very involved with their church they worked with junior high school students in Rancho Cordova & Davis. In the summer of 1972 they moved to their church's camp grounds in Santa Cruise to continue working with their church's youth.

Steve wanted to further his education and enrolled at Northwest Nazarene University in Nampa, Idaho where he studied christian education & music. There they welcomed their first child, a son, named Sam. Steve ended up dropping out of the university so he could open a christian music and bookstore. The business was doing well . . . until he decided to move the store to a newer location. Customers, preferring the 'old town' location, did not follow. So, after a couple of years he had to close the store.

Candice's early employment was collating real estate multiple listings once a week. She found a full time a job at the Everton Mattress Factory sewing mattress and box spring covers from 1972 to 1979. Steve had become a salesman for a christian music company. They decided to moved to Colorado so he would be more centrally located for that traveling job but, sadly again that didn't work out so, in 1980 they moved to Davis, CA where Candice's brother found them a job managing a yogurt shop. They did that for a couple of years but then Steve got a job working at a Nazarene Church school in Davis and they welcomed their 2nd son "AJ" (Andrew James) into the family. The school ended up closing but Steve was able to transfer to a Nazarene school in Utah and this is where their daughter, Joy, was born. After being in Utah for only a year, Steve completely ruptured his Achilles' tendon referring a college basketball game. Surgical repair was required so he was out of commission for a while.

This event made Steve realize that these low paying jobs, tho' jobs he really enjoyed, had to end. They returned to Idaho where he, again, enrolled at the Northwest Nazarene College, 1984 -



1986. Candice also studied, taking 1 year of computer science classes. Steve now wanted to go to seminary so they moved, again, to Kansas City, MO where Candice found employment with a security company. The seminary really didn't fit with Steve so, after a year and a half, they moved back to Davis. The security company Candice was working for had been bought by Pinkerton and Candice was able transfer to the Sacramento office and keep her job as the administrative assistant. She did well in that company - until a NEW part time manager fired (!) her. From there she went to a janitorial company as a data entry person and then she got a job as a 1st to 4th grade reading and math tutor at her church for a couple years. In 1999 she found an opportunity to go to work for the postal service where her income nearly doubled and there were benefits she hadn't had before. Twenty years later she retired.

Like so many of us, Candice's 8th grade sewing class is what got things started. She took sewing all through high school making all her school clothes and, as a senior, finishing with a wool suit. Once married, she sewed many things for herself as well as her family.

Her quilt interest got launched around 2012 when she was going through craft things at a thrift store and she found 2 quart size baggies full of perfectly pieced 9-patch blocks. She made 3 different quilts with these blocks. Candice has no idea why she started doing these 3 quilts but she was inspired by the idea of making a quilt for her Aunt Rosemary. She had no help, no books, she just figured it out on her own. Finally, she bought the Better Homes and Gardens Complete Book of Quilting and watched some You Tube videos. She had made several quilts before she ever thought of joining a guild.

Candice was looking on line about guilds trying to learn when every one met - her rotating schedule with the P.O. was a problem with attending many guilds. She says she emailed someone in the GVQG but never got a response [Ed. comment: shame on whomever received that email & I hope it wasn't me]. She finally picked a guild and decided to visit - she just showed up at a GVQG meeting, she thinks in 2017, and it was our May tea. Sitting at a table, she felt she really got to know the other ladies. She is now member #258. She dove right in BIG TIME when she volunteered to be the Program Chair! She had observed Sheila who seemed to be having so much fun and it seemed the same for Kristine and Sandi. Though Candice persevered, the complication of COVID, along with her mother's illness and passing in July of this year, didn't make things very easy for her.

Candice has made things over the years, like her friends bride's maid dresses, etc. But she has always wanted to have a sewing business. She started one she named *Sew Business Like*, where she did mending and alterations. She once owned a "Tin Lizzy" long arm but it met its demise and she traded it in for her Janome Pro18" Versa. She has renamed her business to *CandyBanks Studio*. She makes custom quilts and does machine quilting. She recently made 12 quilts for a friend in southern California who wanted them made from her father's railroad uniforms. These quilts were given to family and 1 railroad co-worker.

Candice also is now a member of the Sacramento Modern Quilt Guild.

And, she is listed on Etsy under Quilt Finishing.

We are so excited to be having a second Community Service Sew Day in January. By adding in this second CS sewing event, we meet the policies and procedures in our guild's bylaws.

Pat Fryer of Villa Rosa Designs in Grass Valley, CA, has generously offered again to give our guild members a free pattern card of our choice. Linda and I have chosen the pattern "Stepped". This pattern takes 12 fat quarters and 2 yards of background fabric. Villa Rosa has many fat quarter bundles to choose from. And as always, Villa Rosa offers free shipping in the US. Pretty Cool!!

We are using our normal guild meeting night to have this CS sewing event. There will be a brief business meeting at 7pm. As in the past, we will begin setting up at 4pm and be all cleaned up and out of the gym by 9pm.

We will have your free pattern available for you, there will be irons set up, a cutting table and Hazel will bring the batting. You will need to bring your sewing machine and your sewing supplies and fabric.

Bring a brown bag dinner (or you can pop out and get something as there are many restaurants nearby).

Because of these crazy times we are in right now, we completely understand if you would rather sew at your own home that night. Please email or text me and I will personally get a pattern card to you.

PS As in the past, if you choose to work on your own CS project, that is perfectly fine- you are not required to sew the VR pattern. Another tip.... some members have team sewed- one sews the other presses.

Password Advice

Item below is not guild related so,

should you not be interested, please read no further . . .

It is important that you do not EVER use the same password for important places like your bank, your Amazon account, etc. and you do NOT need a password manager app - OR LIST taped to the bottom of your computer.

So, you want a password for, let's say, **Bank** of America. Take the first 2 (or 3) letters **Ba** (this now includes the usually required capital letter)

Add some letters - maybe a deceased pet's name - butch OR words to a favorite song. Old Mc Donald had a Farm would be omdhaf. What ever means something to you.

Add a few numbers. Let's use **2021.** I use the phone number I had as a kid. DO NOT use things like your birth or wedding year.

If accepted (now often required), add a symbol. (!, \$, @, or ? are the most easily accessed on my iPhone keyboard).

So, your Bank of America password is: **Babutch2021!**. Get it? The first 2 letters change, determined the site to which you are trying to log-in, but the rest remains <u>exactly</u> the same and "the rest" is something **VERY** familiar to you and easily remembered. No need for you to write it down. If you ever need to, change it to Ba!butch2021, or !Babutch2021, or !2021Babutch. Or, maybe just change the symbol. <u>Make it easy to remember.</u>
