In this presentation she will talk about her journey as a quilter, techniques that she uses and her desire to get other quilters to work out of their comfort zone and to play with fabric. As Jane says "Give it a go!" She loves to encourage everyone to be inspired and leave the lecture eager to "play" with their fabrics and supplies. She will also include details of her trip to the International Quilt Festival Dubai.

Using a variety of fabrics including scraps, we will fussy cut and trace shapes and then glue them onto the design before free motion quilting. The quilt can either be finished as a 15" hanging using a binding or stretched onto a 12" artist's canvas. Artist Canvas, Interfacing, & Basting Glue will be available for purchase. Set up at 9:00 am and clean up by 4:00 pm. An email update will be sent to enrolled students next week.

Kits are still available if ordered by June 17th. Enrollment is still open - 6 more spaces!

Getting to Know You - Bev Purdue

On April 15, 1943, a little girl, named Beverly Klooz, was born in Denver, Colorado. Her dad owned a gas station, her mom stayed home caring for Bev, and her sister, who was 1 ½ years older. When Bev was 3 years old, a little brother was born.

There was no pre-school or kindergarten for Bev - she leaped right into 1st grade. The school was practically across the street from their house - a short walk across the street and up the hill. Her proudest moment was being picked as Citizen of the Month when she was in 3rd grade - she cherishes the photo of that event.

In 1952, leaving the family in Denver, her dad came to Sacramento for a job with Union Pacific where he was a mechanic for their Trucking Department. Bev's mom soon followed in the car, making the trip alone with 3 kids. Bev's only memory of the trip was stopping at Salt Lake and walking in the water.

In the beginning they lived with their mothers sister but soon moved into their own home. Bev was now in the 4th grade at Strawberry Lane school, where she had to be bussed. After a couple of months she changed to a school that was finally finished being built, Oakridge Elementary School, a K - 8th school, which was just around the corner from her home. Her memories include a very strict 4th grade teacher , who took individual students into the coat room and drilled them on their multiplication tables. The 6th grade teacher was a man, whom she did not like very much. Their family increased by one when her youngest sister was born,

Bev learned to sew by taking the Home Ec. classes in the 7th & 8th grades and the skill was put to good use early on. She was one of 8 girls who had to memorize the Gettysburg Address. Each of them had to sew gathered skirts that matched so they could wear them, with a white blouse, when, in unison, they recited the Gettysburg Address, at a PTA meeting.

For 9th grade she had to transfer to Stanford Junior High on Sacramento Blvd. but it burned down - that street is now Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd.

On to Sacramento High School . . . where she claims to just have been an ordinary student. For graduation ALL the girls made a turquoise gathered skirt, which they wore, with a white blouse, for their graduation ceremony.

After 2 years at Sacramento City College, she transferred to CSUS, graduating with a BA in Elementary Education and a certificate in Library Science. in 1965. When Bev got her first teaching job she also was to be in the librarian. She spent time at the County Office of Education getting books, preparing the card catalog, etc. and she had slight contact with an employee named Kim, whom she knew from one of her library classes. One of this guys co-workers told him that he should ask Bev out - he did and they married in 1967. Bev moved into his apartment in West Sacramento.

On Jan 1, 1970 Bev gave birth to twin boys, Jason and Kirk, and she became a stay at home mom. When the boys were 2 she did a little substitute teaching and substituted for the Yolo County Library, going from library to library if someone called in sick. She never returned full time to the teaching profession while the boys were growing up.

As preschool was ending Bev & Kim bought a house in Fair Oaks and the boys started 1st grade at Fair Oaks Elementary School. When they were in 3rd grade, Bev worked at the school as a teacher's aide.

As a family, their in-laws included, they went camping over at the coast few times. It seems they had a propensity to pick times when they would, inevitably, get rained out.

Bev has been very involved in the organization for the Mother's of Twins - locally and nationally. She was at a state convention when she received a call that her mother had fallen. She had broken her hip . After that her mother lived with them.

In 1988 her boys graduated from Bella Vista. Janson went to CSUS, majoring in biology and works for the Sacramento Waste Water Facility in Elk, Grove. Kirk went to UC Davis, majoring in Psychology. Not really knowing what to do with that degree, his education took few turns and he is now a registered nurse

Over the years, Bev has worked part-time at FabricLand in Rancho Cordova, & Citrus Heights and she also was employed for about 15 years with Toys that Teach.

Bev really can't pin point the moment she decided that she wanted to become a quilter, even though her grandmother had made quilts for her grandchildren. She was in Tayo's one day and saw some information about the GVQG which met at the Lutheran Church of the Ascension. She was curious as to what was going on, she wanted to find something new to attend, and she decided to go to a meeting. She joined that night! Based on an old newsletter, where there is a reference to Donna Palmer's Sampler Block #1. To have received that newsletter, it is estimated that Bev (Member # 33) joined the guild in May of 2003. She was intrigued by that first sampler block and, with zero knowledge about picking fabrics, actually stuck with it and made all the blocks. Once all the blocks were together, she says it was, "The most ugly thing I ever made." She, of course, still has that quilt top ... "somewhere in the house."

Over her many years in the GVQG, she has been president for two consecutive years, secretary, treasurer, membership chair and now, for many years, she has been the one to coordinate the guild's Zephyr Retreats.

Her philosophy is: "If you are going be in it you had better participate in it."

Sew A-Long

As announced earlier this week in an email, we will not be doing a sew-along session this month. Here's a little background and the Board's thought process for the decision.

As you have probably figured out, in life there really is no free lunch - somebody must pay the tab. Although Sheila and I voluntarily took on this project as the reality and loneliness of the pandemic took hold, the truth is that we are receiving a stipend for our services as defined in our policies and procedures. It's not much, but covers rental of Cameo's, purchase of some of our fun prizes to supplement what's been donated, and helps us to restock our stash.

Ask anyone who's attended NCQC Meet the Teachers and signed contracts with our instructors, and you'll see that our instructors aren't cheap. According to our policies and procedures, workshops are a self-supporting activity. Unfortunately, when contracts are signed, the Program Committee has no way of knowing whether we'll be able to fill the class or not. Most instructors have a minimum and maximum number of participants for their workshops. The committee tries to promote the workshops for several months in advance, but if we don't have enough members registered for the workshop, it must be canceled providing the instructor with at least a 30-day notice. This is unfortunate because it often happens that after the speaker does his/her presentation at the meeting several members decide they would, after all, like to learn more about this technique.

Some members voiced the concern that they just couldn't afford \$40 every month to learn a technique they may or may not like. In an effort to fill our workshops, at one point the Board decided to try a pilot program to supplement our Programs budget, thus making the class fee only \$25. This is where we stand today. The fee for Golden Valley members to take a class is much lower than any other neighboring guild.

Now for the stumbling block... the money to supplement our classes comes from the profits of our Opportunity Quilt. Since the pandemic happened and we were no longer able to travel our quilt, last years profits were much lower than previous years. This year there will not be a profit margin either, since we didn't even unveil this year's quilt.

This month, Golden Valley will welcome our first instructor for the new year – Jane Hayworth. There are still a few seats available for her workshop. Sheila and I talked about continuing to offer a Sew-Along session during months when we have a guest instructor. We feel it's inappropriate to offer a "free" Zoom session when the guild is paying an instructor to teach us and the class is not full. The Board is in agreement, so here's the deal... for months like May (Friendship Tea) and August (ice cream social) when we do not have a lecturer, we will continue to do a Sew-Along on the Saturday following our general meeting. We <u>may</u> do an additional Sew-Along session around the second Saturday of the month, <u>if</u> the scheduled workshop is full before the 30 day cancelation window has expired. Because we want everyone to continue growing and learning, Sheila and I don't want to do anything to interfere with your educational opportunities. With that in mind, our next scheduled Sew-Along will be August 28 th and the Villa Rosa pattern is Lily, a lovely log cabin design.
