Vicki wished Happy Birthday to the many members celebrating their birthdays in September.

The minutes for the August guild meeting were approved as submitted.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Zephyr Retreat: The offices at Zephyr just recently returned after evacuating and are working on updating their calendars. They will have information soon about dates, etc. and Vicki will let us all know.

Mercy Retreat: The openings are filled at this time. If you would like to be on a wait list, contact Cordelia or Natalie. There is no deposit required to be on the list.



Getting to Know You - Dianne Round

Dianne Lynn Wiles was born on June 30, 1945 in Omaha Nebraska. She and her mother had to lived with with her grandmother because Dianne's father was in the U.S. Navy, on board a ship in the Philippines that undoubtedly had participated in the deadly 3 February - 3 March major battle of the Philippine Campaign 1944- 45. Dianne's father finally returned home when she was 6 months old.

They moved to Lincoln Nebraska where her father returned to the University of Nebraska to finished his civil engineering degree. During this time, Dianne's younger brother, Don, was born.

Dianne has had too many "dam" moves in her life. That is because her father was in the dam building business: Huskerville, Nebraska, Indianola, Nebraska. Stockton, Kansas, Massena, New York, Youngstown, New York, & Oroville, California. If a dam was being built, this is where her dad went. She hated moving and leaving friends behind and having to make new ones. But I get ahead of myself.

Indianola is where, at the age of 5, Dianne started 1st grade and her youngest brother was born.

Dianne attended 2nd through 5th grades in Stockton, Kansas. Her 5th grade teacher wasVERY special. When Dianne had to move, the teacher bought her Little Women and had all the class sign it. Dianne kept in touch with this teacher, Miss June, into her adulthood. The summer that Dianne turned 9 she accompanied her deeply cherished grandmother on a train trip to California. On that trip, Dianne was exposed to much of the greater bay area.

Dianne started 6th grade in Massena, New York, on the St. Lawrence Sea Way. It was SO cold there in the winter and she had to walk to school every day. One day it was -42°. When Dianne was 13 her sister was born.

In the middle of 9th grade Dianne moved to Youngstown, New York, on Lake Ontario, where she attended high school. When she was a senior one of her girl friends introduced her to a guy, whose name was Dennis. He was also born in Nebraska so they had a lot of things in common. Dennis was in the army and stationed at Fort Niagra. Hearts were broken when he got discharged and moved to California, but they kept in touch with letters.

After high school, she was accepted at the University of Kansas, but dad landed a job with the Department of Resources in California so, her plans took a different compass heading - she wanted to go to California more than she wanted to go to Kansas. (Dennis?) The family ended up in Oroville with dad working on the Oroville dam.

Dianne didn't travel to California with the family. Instead (at 18 & alone) she experienced her first plane ride from Buffalo to Omaha to visit her grandmother, then she took the train from Omaha to California with a transfer in Chicago. When she got to Oroville IT WAS HOT - 106! She was thinking this move was a big mistake?

It should be no surprise to learn that Dianne and Dennis started seeing each other again. Dianne looked at some CA universities but she ended up going to Yuba College in Marysville for 2 years - riding the bus every day. She got her AA degree and then married Dennis. They moved to Chico where Dennis managed a shoe store. They had a daughter, Jody. Dennis got a transfer to Rancho Cordova. She and a neighbor started a little business painting apartment interiors. She had a son, Brian. Now, this is where her life really began to change. Another neighbor talked Dianne into applying as a security officer - she ended up working retail security in grocery and department stores. She, eventually, became the security manager for Liberty House where, because of shoplifters, she met a lot of sheriff deputies. They started to encourage her to take the test and become a deputy sheriff - she took it and passed. In January of 1975, she found herself in the Sacramento County Sheriff's Academy. Family circumstances worked out well for Dianne because her husband had injured his leg quite badly in a motorcycle accident and couldn't work, He was able to take care of the kids because Dianne had to LIVE at the Academy.

Upon completion, Dianne's 1st position was working at the Rio Consumes Correctional Center, followed by the main jail, & then Patrol Training. Dianne was THE FIRST female to <u>complete</u> Patrol Training. She became the 1st female Field Training Officer, & then the 1st female Detective. She was promoted to Sargent and was the Academy Director for 2 years. She was promoted to Lieutenant and ended up as the Executive Lieutenant of the North Central Division with 100 people below her. Diane's daughter followed in her footsteps and has recently retired as a Lieutenant.

Though Dianne's marriage ended in 1984, she continued to have a good relationship with Dennis and now helps, along with her daughter, to support him as he is living in a board and care facility. They take him to doctor appointments, they all go out to lunch together now and then, etc. Their children have always appreciated the effort their parents made to keep this working relationship. The family has grown considerably - Dianne has 5 grand children and 2 great grandchildren.

So how did Dianne end up as a member of the guild? Like most of us, she took sewing in the 7th grade. Over the years she had made various things - like a few maternity outfits. When she retired she decided she wanted to "make a few things" again and she bought herself a new machine. She was thinking of new curtains and placemats. She had a friend from the Academy who made quilts and would often tell Dianne to start making quilts. One day she was in the Carmichael Beverly's, saw a quilt she loved, and took the class. Then she took more classes, then went to her 1st quilt show - a Folsom Quilt Show. She was so impressed by what she saw! When she was helping at Beverly's taking in quilts for Beverly's quilt show, Dianne had a conversation with someone from our guild, about our Zephyr retreats and that there was 1 opening left. She came to a meeting, filled out a membership form and a Zephyr form and the rest is history!
