Meet our February Speaker

Unlike many of us, Debbie didn't learn to sew as a child. She learned while sitting in her son's hospital room, waiting for him to awaken from a coma after a near fatal accident. As the months passed, she stitched a log cabin quilt by hand. One nurse found her a mattress pad for batting and another gave her a flat fold sheet for backing. Her son eventually did wake up and cherishes that quilt to this day.

From the log cabin strips, she moved on to frog fabric – any kind of frogs, whimsical or in nature. And with that, her love of fabric and her quilting journey took off. In August, 1996, Debbie was invited to join the Pioneer Quilt Guild where she honed her skills and improved her technique. She started long-arming in 2009. She opened Angel Quilters just outside the city limits of Lincoln, CA, in August, 2010. In her new shop, Debbie offered classes and an area for ladies to sit and sew. It didn't take the ladies long to talk her into buying some fabric and notions so they didn't have to go to Roseville whenever they forgot something from home.

She joined the vendor circuit in 2010 with the Loomis Tea, then joined in the shop hops and Rusty Barn Quilt Exhibits. She and her sons traveled around the western states meeting lots of interesting people and making some lifelong friends while on the Rusty Barn circuit.

Eventually, the desire to be home was more appealing than traveling from one venue to another. She settled back into the shop routine with the long-arm running in the background. Thinking of moving to stay close to her family, and thanks to the decline of foot traffic because of Covid, Debbie liquidated most of the fabric and notions in her shop. She still has the sit and sew area and teaches classes but most days you'll find her in the back room happily overseeing the long-arm.



Getting to Know You - Robin Bess

On the 19th of June, 1968, Allen and Beverly Leibl were living in Ottowa, Ontario, Canada. On that day, their 3-year old son, Brian got a little sister, Robin Laurie. Allen worked for a software company finding/buying needed properties/buildings all over the world. When Robin was very young her dad worked days and her mom worked nights as a data entry operator.

Robin has a VERY strong childhood memory - Jan. 1975 - when Disney World opened the Space Mountain ride. The family went to Florida, stood in line for <u>hours</u> for the ride, which they knew nothing about, and it was a terrifying experience for Robin and her father!

Robin attended K through 5th grade in Canada. When she was 11, her father was transferred to Simi Valley, CA where she attended 6th & 7th grades. Then her dad was transferred to San Jose where she attended 8th - 12th grades. Mom worked as a high school resource teacher working with ESL classes. In middle school, drawing and calligraphy interests surfaced but, better yet, she was one of the only 2 girls who played in the (hardball) baseball league. She proudly reports, "I could smoke any boy out there when it came to hitting home runs, and playing 1st base." She thinks she was pretty boring in high school. She played soccer, had a few close friends, but she was really focused on learning and getting her self prepared for college. No boys were worth her time. Woodworking class and graphic design were favorite classes. She frequented the school's print workshop - where she was able to silk screen t-shirts and make lots of personally designed note pads for family, friends & herself.

After graduation she enrolled at San Jose State, majoring in advertising & minoring in humanities. Her mom strongly encouraged her to join a sorority - to make friends. Robin acknowledges that it was one of the best choices she has ever made in her life. She ended up being president of her sorority and then Panhellenic President (governing body of all sororities) - which was way out of her comfort zone).

The sorority had dances called "*Trust your Sister*" where sisters would draw names and then they had to fix that person up with a date. Robin coerced this girl to pick a guy she had previously ONLY seen at a party - she thought he had very kind eyes - he accepted. Robin and Richard Bess (member Pam Bess' son) have been together ever since.

Rich was majoring in Administration of Justice but after interning as a Parole Officer he decided that was not what he wanted to do. He ended up in sales and program management, graduated in 1989, and went to work for an electronics company. Robin graduated in 1991. They knew they wanted to get married but it was important to both of them that they get jobs, and save some money so they could buy a house. They got married on July 25, 1993, after being together for 7 years.

Originally, though was a long commute, Robin went to work at World Savings Bank in Pleasanton to train to be an assistant branch manager but, after a couple of years, she decided the banking business was not for her. She then went to Allstate as an adjuster for 5 years. Her daughter, Jenna, was born May 18, 1998. The commute from San Jose to Pleasanton became just too far, and time consuming, so she found a

closer job with AAA. Their son, Richard Bret, was born on May 3, 2001 AND in June Robin became a citizen of the United States!

She thought she had hit a rocky slope because AAA laid her off but it turned out to be a blessing because her son, now 16 months old, got kidney cancer - losing all of his right kidney and ¼ of the left. Not wanting to leave her son and return to work outside the home she did day care with a friend. Just after her son started kindergarten, she got a call back from AAA. She ended up working for AAA for 15 years.

After their son graduated from high school Robin & Bret moved to Blackstone (El Dorado Hills area) to be near both of their parents and other extended family. No AAA positions were available so she now works for Progressive as an appraiser of damaged vehicles. Golden Valley benefited when Robin, tagging along with her mother-in-law to a meeting she decided to join the GVQG that summer.

About 4 ½ years ago Robin had been in a car accident, had a bad concussion, and developed post conclusive syndrome and was unable to work for about a year. Her doctor told her she needed to try to learn something new to keep her brain from atrophying so . . . anticipating the birth of a grand nephew she wanted to make a "milestone blanket." She purchased a little Brother sewing machine and she taught herself to sew. She made the blanket 3 times over, what with all the tearing out of stitches she had to do to figure out how to make it. She then thought she would teach herself how to quilt! She learned quickly that the 2 month old little Brother (on which she made 13 quilts) just wouldn't do. She bought a nicer sewing machine, which she has now replaced with a Janome that has an even a bigger throat. AND she now has a mid-arm that fits on her quilting frame. Proving her mother-in-law's warning that quilting is an expensive hobby.

Robin says, "It's a slippery slope, but what a pleasure it is to sew on that new machine. There has been a big learning cure but it has bolstered my passion for quilting." During the pandemic she has been part of Folsom's mask makers and she doesn't limit her sewing to just quilts. She also makes purses, stuffed animals, home decor - her hands are in a lot of different craft things and loves to give them away

Robin's daughter majored in International Relations and graduated from UCD in 2020 and her son is now attending community college.

Unable to find the type of work he want to do near their home, Rich remains employed as a Program Manager by a company iso has quite a commute to Fremont. He lives there during the week and comes home for the weekends. They are anticipating that Rich will be able to work from home on Fridays SOON. Robin becomes an obsessive sewer during the weekdays after work - at least when their 6 month old Cattle Dog, Kaia, (that chews everything) isn't demanding her attention.

In 2014 Robin's son needed a kidney transplant. In October of 2020 he got cancer in this transplanted kidney. Luckily, this tumor was discovered early and it was able to be surgically removed with no loss of kidney function. The medical issues that Richard Bret has experienced has given this **entire family** a unique appreciation of the gift of life


MEMBERSHIP




