

Bake a white cake - (using 2 cake pans)


Mix:


- 8 oz sour cream

Mini Group Sign Ups

Mini groups are smaller groups of members who get together and make their own rules: how many to have (limited by available space), how often, plus when and where to meet, activities (hand work, machine work, field trips, individual or group projects, etc.). It's a great way to develop friendships with other quilters and to learn from and encourage one another. You can add new members if you have room to grow as you meet new people at our guild meetings. For example, the group I am in has eight members and we rotate homes (but at least a couple of groups meet at a business where they can bring machines). We meet twice a month and mostly work on our own projects, but sometimes we have taken a field trip, or done something as a group. Since we meet through the lunch hour, we bring our own sack lunch. You can discuss the parameters of your group at your first meeting. You don't have to sign in blood to join as you are always free to leave one group and join another.

If you are interested in joining a mini group, email me at kareng822@pm.me, and give me your name, email, available meeting times including day or evening, and which days you are available to meet. Depending on interest, I will put those who match criteria together and call one person and ask them to call the rest of the names. So, join a group, make some new friends and have people to sit with at the meetings!



Thank you Pat, for speaking up. Blessing #2.

Even though my attendance and participation was sporadic during "the Covid years", I was moved to volunteer, I needed to meet people! I felt the need to help in my new community. Everything had been shut down for soooo long!!

In July 2021, I became the guild's Community Service chairperson. Blessing #3.

Oh, what fun I had! Not being a seasoned seamstress or even a seasoned quilter, the quilts that were handed to me month after month, the quilts that I, plus help from volunteering guild members, paraded around the guild meeting room at our monthly meeting, was pure Joy!

Yes, it is quite a leap from collecting stacks and stacks of beautiful quilts to being responsible for the guild's money... but I say this sincerely, "Thank You, Theresa Abler" for the multiple training sessions, for the laughs, the sighs, the directions, and for answering all my questions as I tried to task it all to memory. And yes, I think I got this. Blessing #6

I think maybe I have enjoyed counting all my life but didn't realize it would evolve into any or all that it has.

Counting heads as my sibs and I packed into our station wagon.. 1,2,3.....9, yep we're all here! Counting the number of now impossible jumps on a jump rope, counting steps as I marched down the football field with my HS band, counting laps during my time swimming on the masters program, counting respirations and fetal heartbeats during my working years, before the age of electronics.

Now, I feel like I need to throw in a plug here for a Treasurer Elect. Think about it..maybe you like counting like I do, organization, spreadsheets, and balancing numbers... fun and rewarding for me.... could it be for you?

Sheila Galuza - Saturday's Sew Along. Hello Quilters! This second Saturday, June 11, is another Zoom Sew-Along, Yay! We are using a Villa Rosa pattern called, English Garden. You can order online from VR or purchase at Swifty Stitches. The time is from 10am to 2pm.

I am here to tell you that it was the fastest quilt top that I have ever sewn together!! Start with 2 yards of a focal fabric and 2yds of a contrasting fabric. Many brave and fearless quilters use an Ombre for the contrasting fabric, I did not.

I began pressing my focal fabric on Friday at 11am. As prior to 11am, I started the day's laundry, had hit the gym for an hour, time in the sauna, back home switch the laundry, shower and whew! It was 11 already, time to start on my sample quilt for the next Zoom S-A. Just then my husband was passing through the living room to get a refill on his water (he is still working from home), I commented, "Say, on your lunch hour, what if we did the grocery shopping together." He replied, "I can go right now." So off we went. When we got back home, there is the putting away of groceries, making lunch, switching the loads of laundry (Sorry Caroline, I wasn't finished by 9am!) and starting yet another load in the washing machine. After all that, I decided that a nap sounded good to me. Upon awaking, I saw my beautiful fabric all pressed and ready to cut. But, the laundry needed folding, (my wonderful husband had switched the loads) and I should probably get dinner started before starting to sew. I got a notification that one of my books was soon due back at the library, and decided that I couldn't send it back without finishing it, could you? An *hour and half* later, all done! I wonder if the next book in the series is available? After dinner, my husband said, "What about a Friday night date? Let's ride our bikes along the river." Sounds good to me. An *hour and a half* later we were back home. It was beginning to get dark and that is family reading time. After that I went off to bed.

Saturday morning, breakfast finished and my husband was off to play pickleball, it was time to start on my quilt! I began cutting, it went so fast, six minutes I think. I immediately cut the second fabric. Each piece is cut into 12 five inch strips. Next, cut off the selvages and sew the strips end to end (remember the Jelly Roll race???) I pressed the focal fabric strip, but not the contrasting strip. I really wanted to get sewing! I ended up just pressing what I needed on the contrasting fabric for the next strip to sew. It worked for me. Remember those 2, *hour and a half* comments earlier? Must be my magic time! *With cutting, pressing, sewing, pressing, sewing, etc., all the way through,* I was finished with my top in 1½ hours! When my sweet husband saw the top, he said, "This one is a keeper!" I already bought fabric and have my second top planned for sew along Saturday.

Thoughts and Musings as I sewed:

If you don't like the idea of seams appearing randomly throughout your quilt, go ahead and from your 5" strips, cut out your quilt pieces and then sew them together in order. Do not sew your strips end to end first.

I never pinned before sewing. I thought of Tracy Trimble and how she diligently pins. Feel free to pin each strip before sewing together.

This quilt top finishes up at 54" x 72" For some of you, that is larger than you'd like to make. I think it would adapt very well to a smaller size. Just quit adding strips when the quilt is the size that you like. I am planning on trying this quilt pattern with 2 ½" strips- I think that will lend itself to a smaller lap or wheelchair size quilt very easily.

I had some fabric strips left over after finishing the top. I decided to cut them into 1" strips and make a mini version. It is coming along nicely and when Linda Sliepen saw it the other day, she commented that it would make a nice trivet for a casserole dish.

I hope you join Linda and me for a fun-filled Sew-Along Saturday in June.

Sew Along



Just in time for summer, Sew Along is back! Join us on June 11, 2022, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. to make this lovely 54" x 72" quilt, titled English Garden. It required 2 yards of a theme print, 2 yards of background ombre or any contrast, and 5/8 yards of fabric for binding.

An ombre used in this pattern will add dimension or depth to your quilt; however, an interesting contrast fabric will also enhance it. For example, Vivian used a floral theme print and a wood print for contrast. Her quilt looks like flowers along a fence.

A smaller version (40" x 56") of this pattern is titled *Endless Love*. Everything is the same except the quilt is smaller, requires less fabric and you sew skinnier strips together. You may order a digital download of the pattern or the pattern card directly from the Villa Rosa Designs website.

The first garden strawberry was grown in Brittany, France, during the late 18th century. Prior to this, wild strawberries and cultivated selections from wild strawberry species were the common source of the fruit.

The strawberry fruit was mentioned in ancient Roman literature in reference to its medicinal use. The French began taking the strawberry from the forest to their gardens for harvest in the 14th century. Charles V, France's king from 1364 to 1380, had 1,200 strawberry plants in his royal garden. In the early 15th century western European monks were using the wild strawberry in their illuminated manuscripts. The strawberry is found in Italian, Flemish, and German art, and in English miniatures. The entire strawberry plant was used to treat depressive illnesses.

By the 16th century, references of cultivation of the strawberry became more common. People began using it for its supposed medicinal properties and botanists began naming the different species. In England the demand for regular strawberry farming had increased by the mid-16th century.

The combination of strawberries and cream was created by Thomas Wolsey in the court of King Henry VIII. Instructions for growing and harvesting strawberries showed up in writing in 1578. The garden strawberry was transplanted from the forests and then the plants would be propagated by cutting off the runners. [Wikipedia]



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WHEELCHAIR QUILT


The wheelchair quilts that we make at Sunshine Linus are very simple and easy to make.

The quilts measure $36" \times 36"$ with the bottom corners cut out to make way for the wheels of the wheelchair.



- ≈ Cut 16 x 9 ½" fabric squares
- ≈ Sew into four rows of four.
- Using a quilting ruler and rotary cutter, cut the two outside bottom squares diagonally.
- ≈ Quilt & Bind as desired.





An alternative pattern would be:

- ≈ Cut 144 x 3 ½ squares sewn into 12 rows of 12 squares.
- a Cut diagonally through the bottom three
 squares on the two outside bottom squares.
- ≈ Quilt & Bind as desired.
